

The River Danube flows right through the heart of Budapest and thus creates a point of reference for visitors who are either on the old cobbled streets on the Buda side, or in the 19th century boulevards on the Pest side. Your interests will decide on which side of the Danube you will spend most of your time. Anyone interested in history will find it difficult to tear oneself away from Buda, where the Palace summit creates an atmosphere of medieval Budapest. Shopaholics will very soon be enticed by the other side of the river where the shops and nightlife compete for everyone's attention.

Budapest is really the fusion of three towns, Buda, Óbuda and Pest. Back in 106 AD, the Romans founded the city of Aquincum in the north-east corner of the Danube. Several changes of population later, at the end of the 9th century, the Magyars arrived. They were descended from a Finnish-Ugrian tribe with roots in Siberia. The Magyar city, with its palace and ring-wall, came to be called Buda, and Aquincum was later called Óbuda. The other side of the river was also settled, in the area which would later be called Pest.

Having been invaded by the Turks - and later by the Austrian army - in 1867 Hungary was elevated to an equal partner in the Austro-Hungarian double monarchy. Budapest became one of the most important ports on the Danube and soon also an industrial centre.

The Great Synagogue (Nagy Zsinagóga)

is where the Main Synagogue is located, the largest in the world outside of New York. There is a Jewish museum beside the synagogue, not t confused with the separate Holocaust Museum far away in Páva St.

Castle of Buda



The palace on Buda Hill contains several museums, including the Ludwig Museum, the National Gallery and the Budapest Historical

Museum. There are also narrow alleys and magnificent churches. The walled Castle Hill (Várhegy) is a UNESCO World Heritage site. This is actually a collection of different sights to see, but many people simply enjoy wandering the now-quiet streets of this once-bustling district, taking in the views and enjoying



generously-priced refreshments, so do allow a good few hours.

Chain Bridge (Széchenyi Lánchíd)



This iconic Budapest sight was the first of Budapest's bridges, built in 1847 and was an engineering marvel. The bridge was saved from

destruction twice in the 1849 conficts, but was eventually put out of action in Word War II as a huge battle raged across the city. Nowadays there is an annual festival called "the Summer on the Chain Bridge" - at this time only pedestrians are allowed and there are exciting events happening on the weekends.

This is a famous boulevard dating back to the early 1870's that has been declared a World Heritage Site. Apart from being a good shopping

street in the lower reaches, it is home to many grand old villas, mansions and embassies, as well as a number of sights like a Heroes' Square, the State Opera House and an 8-sided square, if you will, called Oktogon. The first and oldest Metro, the yellow coloured M1 or "Millenium Metro" runs the length of Andrássy Avenue, just under the surface of the roadway.

House of Terror (Terror Háza)

Great Market Hall (Vásárcsárnok)



This public market is known as a real slice of Hungarian daily life. Here you can see authentic greengrocers, cheese merchants and butchers

all rubbing elbows in a wonderful cacophony of sounds and scents unlike anywhere else.

The Great Market Hall was built to replace the expansive outdoor markets in 1894, by architect Samu Pecz, also known for the red brick reform church by the Buda riverside north of Batthány tér. The Market Hall's basement area houses the less-scenic fish stalls and supermarket, the ground floor is the main area for all kinds of foodstuffs, and the upper floor (check out the beautiful wrought-iron staircases) is home to souvenir stands and fast-food joints, Hungarian-style. You must try some deep-fried

Tanti is named after a dear aunt, and like a fussy aunt, is quite strict about mealtimes. Dinner is served from 6pm until midnight, though lunch is also

Budapest is famous for its moderately priced antiques which you can find in places such as the Falk Miksa utca quarter. One of the most popular Hungarian souvenirs is handmade Herend porcelain, which has been in production since 1828. The beautiful, hand-painted vases, dishes and porcelain have won many gold medals at various world exhibitions. The factory's own shop is on József Nádor square.

Around the corner lies Vörösmarty Square, where you can either gather energy with a cup of coffee and a cream cake at the city's most famous patisserie, Café Gerbeaud, or carry on to the former Luxus department store with the international fashion houses' most famous stores.

The Váci utca pedestrian street between Vörösmarty square and the Market Square is Budapest's largest shopping centre. This is where you will find the international fashion houses' own stores, souvenir shops, wine shops and several galleries. Do not miss the small cross-streets with their sweet little shops and upscale wine merchants. Many Budapest residents think that the prices in this area are too high and instead do their shopping in Pest's gigantic Westend or in the shops in the Great Ring, which is what they call the boulevard



around the city centre.

The new, young shops are scattered around the centre on the Pest side. Király Street is being transformed into a design centre. Do not miss Nagycsarnok on Vámház street, Budapest's great market hall built in 1896, which has everything that Hungary can offer in the way of food. Here you can buy Hungarian specialities such as, for example, the world-renowned Tokay wine Tokaji Aszú. "The wine of kings, the king of wines" - its special flavour is of sweet, overly ripe and shrivelled grapes. A dessert wine which complements cakes and desserts perfectly. Great Market Hall (Vásárcsárnok)



This public market is known as a real slice of Hungarian daily life. Here you can see authentic greengrocers, cheese merchants and butchers

all rubbing elbows in a wonderful cacophony of sounds and scents unlike anywhere else. The Great Market Hall was built to replace the expansive outdoor markets in 1894, by architect Samu Pecz, also known for the red brick reform church by the Buda riverside north of Batthány tér. The Market Hall's basement area houses the less-scenic fish stalls and supermarket, the ground floor is the main area for all kinds of foodstuffs, and the upper floor (check out the beautiful wrought-iron staircases) is home to souvenir stands and fast-food joints, Hungarian-style. You must try some deep-fried dough or Lángos.

The Downtown Market on Hold Street is a must-have gastro spot where you can try several high quality casual eateries, often led by

renowned Budapest chefs, such as Tamás Széll, who won the European Championship of Bocuse d'Or in 2016, and won Special Plate Prize and 4th place in the World Championship of the same contest in 2017.

The building itself was thoroughly renovated in 2014 and it has two floors: one for the traditional market, and one for street food kiosks. The market vendors sell fresh fruit, vegetables and other local, traditional products. You can find typical Hungarian specialities such as grey cattle beef and mangalica pork. Downtown Market is not far from the Parliament Building, the Basilica and Szabadság Square, so you can jump in for a short snack break without getting too far from the important spectacles.



Király Thermal Bath



Arslan, the Turkish Pasha of Buda, began constructing this bath in 1565 and it was completed shortly afterwards by his heir

Sokoli Mustafa. The Király Medicinal Bath has never had a direct source of thermal water – it was built far from the springs to ensure the Turks had somewhere to bathe inside the city walls in times of siege. The water is supplied by pipes from near today's Lukács Bath.

Király Thermal Bath has four pools with hot spring water with calcium, magnesium, hydrogen-carbonate and sulphate, also containing sodium and with a substantial content of fluoride ions. Steam baths, sauna, underwater water jet massage and many other services are also available.

The Open-Air Bath, located o-n the Margit island, in a nature conservation area, was opened as a beach o-n the bank of the Danube in

1919. With the construction of the large pool it



was transformed in 1921 into an open-air bath. Owing to its high popularity it had to be expanded, therefore an architectural project tender was launched in 1937, as a result of which the plans composed by István Janáky were accepted.

In 2002 the pools of the Open-Air Bath were modernised, they were equipped with water filtering and revolving devices. The swimming pool was shaped into three sections: swimming pool, fancy pool and beach pool. Of these, the fancy pool is expecting visitors with neck shower, effervescence generator and whirling corridor.
